

Saint Margaret of Cortona

Feast day: February 22

Poor Margaret! When she was only 7 years old her mother died. To make matters worse, her father remarried and her new stepmom wasn't very nice. Sound like a fairytale you know? Did you guess Cinderella? Well, unlike Cinderella, she didn't have talking mice to help her out.

After a few years of living with her father and stepmother, Margaret met a man named Arsenio, and ran off with him. (This man was no Prince Charming! Margaret led a sinful life with him and the two had a son together.)

Ever catch yourself doing something wrong and you know it is wrong, but you do it anyway? You know you should change your behavior, but you choose not to? Well, this is how it was for Margaret. She knew she wasn't leading a Godly life, but she wasn't ready to change yet.

One day, while Margaret waited for Arsenio to come home, only his dog returned. This was one smart dog! Margaret scratched the dog between the ears but instead of sitting and wagging his tail, he grabbed Margaret's apron and began tugging on it. Sensing something might be wrong, she followed the dog. Unfortunately, the dog led her to where her husband laid dead — murdered!

Chair of Peter

THE CHAIR of Peter, the only piece of furniture with a feast day on the Catholic calendar, is honored each year on February 22. The chair is largely symbolic. It is a way of speaking of the authority of the one who uses it. A cathedral carries that name because it is named for the bishop's chair, the *cathedra*. A pope speaks *ex cathedra*—"from the chair"—when he gives official pronouncements. We use a similar expression when we say a judge speaks "from the bench." The furniture represents the authority of the one who speaks from it.

The day honors the tradition that St. Peter became the bishop of Antioch on this day before becoming bishop of Rome, an event that was formerly honored on January 18. In fact, January 18–25 became the week of prayer for Christian unity because those dates bridge the days assigned to two great Christian biblical leaders: the Chair of Peter and the Conversion of St. Paul. Revisions to the calendar combined the two feasts of Peter, and the more ancient of the two, February 22, remained.

It is doubtful that Peter actually sat in a designated chair to rule the Christians of Rome, and even more doubtful that that chair has been preserved. However, in the ninth century Charles the Bald gave what some believed to be Peter's chair to the Vatican. It is enshrined against the back wall of the St. Peter's Basilica beneath the alabaster image of the Holy Spirit, inside a reliquary designed by Gianlorenzo Bernini above what is appropriately called the Altar of the Chair.

The Collect for the day acknowledges the confession of faith made by Peter, upon whom Christ built the Church. His successors, the popes, occupy his "chair," and speak with his authority.
